UW-Superior Visual Arts Department offers many options that enable you to develop your talents and pursue a meaningful career. Students can major in Visual Arts and then specialize their studies by selecting a concentration in Art **Education**, Art History, Art Therapy or Studio Art.

The Visual Arts concentrations include:

Art Education Concentration

Courses in art and education lead to certification to teach at levels from birth to age 21.

Art History Concentration

A blend of art studio and art history courses leading to a comprehensive knowledge of art.

Art Therapy Concentration

Combine art training with courses in psychology to prepare for work as an art therapist in hospitals, nursing homes, rehabilitation centers and schools.

UW-Superior also offers a graduate program in art therapy that enables students to further their careers and pursue professional certification.

Studio Art Concentration

Develop a knowledge of art and focus on art training in a specific medium including ceramics, expressive ecopsychology, fibers, painting, photography, printmaking and sculpture.

What can you do with a degree in Visual Arts from UW-Superior?

According to the U.S. Department of Labor, more than half of all professional artists are self-employed. Of those who are not self-employed, many work in advertising and related services; newspaper, periodical, book, and software publishers; motion picture and video industries; specialized design services; and computer systems design and related services. Some self-employed artists offer their services to advertising agencies, design firms, publishing houses, and other businesses on a contract or freelance basis.

Employment of artists and related workers is expected to grow about as fast as the average over the next decade. Because the arts attract many talented people with creative ability, the number of aspiring artists continues to grow.
