UW-Superior offers a major in economics that prepares students for a wide range of business, government or education careers as well as for graduate school or law school. The economics major is the most employable liberal arts major and pays some of the highest starting salaries because Economics students possess critical thinking, problem solving and effective communication skills, and abilities that are highly valued by employers. Many students choose to combine this major with another major or a minor in areas such as business, political science, history or geographic information systems.

Economics is a social science that studies how the economy works. It addresses such questions as: Why are some countries poor while others are rich? What causes economic booms and recessions and what can we do about it? How much to produce? What price to charge? How much and what to buy or sell? By learning how to analyze and solve various socio-

economic problems in a concise and logical manner, economics majors acquire skills that are helpful in almost any career.
