The following information is intended to provide you with a general overview of the University of Wisconsin -Superior campus safety and security. It is not intended as a contractual agreement between the University of Wisconsin-Superior and the recipients of this information.

Being prepared for any emergency can create a higher level of personal security for each member of our campus community. It is my personal goal to enable each of you to easily attain the information you need to assist keeping yourself and possibly others safe.

This annual Campus Crime Report has been published to comply with the Clery Act. This federal law, formally known as, The Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act of 1990, states that this information will be sent to all students and employees. Any applicant for employment or enrollment will also be issued a copy of this report upon request.

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Campus Description

The University of Wisconsin-Superior is a public institution of higher education located on 221.3 acres of land of which 144.5 acres is on our main campus and 76.8 acres is located on the southern shoreline of Lake Superior. The City of Superior's population is approximately 28,000 residents. The UWS Campus maintains 17 buildings on the main Campus. Over 2,730 students are currently enrolled at UW- Superior. Four residence halls house 585 students within walking distance from all University buildings. The University employs approximately 400 Faculty members and Staff.

The University of Wisconsin-Superior Campus Safety Office is responsible for the security and assistance response at UW-Superior. Located in the lower level of the Rothwell Student Center, room number 53, the office is easily accessible to all students, staff and members of the community.

The Campus Safety Office consists of the Director of Campus Safety (a sworn Wisconsin State Police Officer), one full-time sworn Wisconsin State Police Officer, six full-time Classified Campus Safety Security Officers, and several part-time Student Dispatchers. The Superior Police Department assists in providing law enforcement services to the campus. The Superior Police Department employs 52 officers and is located five blocks away from campus.

St. Mary's Duluth-Superior Hospital and the Superior Fire Department are both located within a mile of the university. Three additional hospitals are located within 10 miles from UW-Superior in Duluth, Minnesota.



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To report a crime or to request assistance, members of the campus community should call the Campus Safety Office at 715-394-8114 or the Superior Police Department at 715-394-0234. In an emergency when someone is severely injured, sick or in danger, call 911. If in doubt, CALL. It is important to not hang up the phone until the 911 operator instructs you to do so. In addition, 16 emergency telephones mounted on brown pylons topped by blue lights are located throughout the UW–Superior Campus. Once an emergency telephone is activated the caller may speak with a campus safety officer en route to the caller’s location. The Campus Safety Office maintains direct telephone and two-way radio contact with the Superior Police Department; Douglas County Sheriff’s Department and the Superior Fire and ambulance service. The Campus Safety Office phone number is prominently displayed on all public phones and in the campus telephone directory. The number is also included on all of the department's printed publications, brochures, pamphlets, and at the Campus Safety Office web site.

Sec. 668.46 (b) Annual security report.

An institution must prepare an annual security report that contains, at a minimum, the following information:

- (1) The crime statistics described in paragraph (c) of this section.
- (c) Crime statistics.

(1) Crimes that must be reported. An institution must report statistics for the three most recent calendar years concerning the occurrence on campus, in or on noncampus buildings or property, and on public property of the following that are reported to local police agencies or to a campus security authority:

- (i) Criminal homicide:
 - (A) Murder and nonnegligent manslaughter.
 - (B) Negligent manslaughter.
- (ii) Sex offenses:
 - (A) Forcible sex offenses.
 - (B) Nonforcible sex offenses.
- (iii) Robbery.
- (iv) Aggravated assault.
- (v) Burglary.
- (vi) Motor vehicle theft.
- (vii) Arson.
- (viii) (A) Arrests for liquor law violations, drug law violations, and illegal weapons possession.
- (B) Persons not included in paragraph (c)(1)(viii)(A) of this section, who were referred for campus disciplinary action for liquor law violations, drug law violations, and illegal weapons possession.



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(2) Recording crimes. An institution must record a crime statistic in its annual security report for the calendar year in which the crime was reported to a campus security authority.

(3) Reported crimes if a hate crime. An institution must report, by category of prejudice, any crime it reports pursuant to paragraphs (c)(1)(i) through (vii) of this section, and any other crime involving bodily injury reported to local police agencies or to a campus security authority, that manifest evidence that the victim was intentionally selected because of the victim's actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or disability.

Hate Crimes

** Race, Gender, Religion, Sexual Orientation, Ethnicity, Disability, refer to motivational factors in reported crimes.

Crimes from all of the above definitions that show evidence that the victim(s) was intentionally selected because of the victim's actual or perceived race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, ethnicity, and/or disability.

(4) Crimes by location. The institution must provide a geographic breakdown of the statistics reported under paragraphs (c)(1) and (3) of this section according to the following categories:

- (i) On campus.
- (ii) Of the crimes in paragraph (c)(4)(i) of this section, the number of crimes that took place in dormitories or other residential facilities for students on campus.
- (iii) In or on a non-campus building or property.
- (iv) On public property.

Geographic Locations for Crime Statistics

On Campus

1. Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonable contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls; and
2. Any building or property that is within or reasonably contiguous to the area identified in paragraph (1) of this definition, that is owned by the institution but controlled by



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another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes (such as a food or other retail vendor).

Non-Campus Property

1. Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization that is officially recognized by the institution; or
2. Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to, the institution's educational purposes, is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonable contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Public Property

All public property, including thoroughfares, streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the campus, or immediately adjacent to and accessible from the campus.

Local and State Police

Data provided by Local and State Police that is from reported crimes in areas that are immediately adjacent to, and accessible from campus properties, but are not owned by the University.

(5) Identification of the victim or the accused. The statistics required under paragraphs (c)(1) and (3) of this section may not include the identification of the victim or the person accused of committing the crime.

(6) Pastoral and professional counselor. An institution is not required to report statistics under paragraphs (c)(1) and (3) of this section for crimes reported to a pastoral or professional counselor.

(7) UCR definitions. Crime Definitions from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Handbook An institution must compile the crime statistics required under paragraphs (c)(1) and (3) of this section using the definitions of crimes provided in appendix A to this subpart and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Hate Crime Data Collection Guidelines and Training Guide for Hate Crime Data Collection. For further guidance concerning the application of definitions and classification of crimes, an institution must use either the UCR Reporting Handbook or the UCR Reporting Handbook: NIBRS EDITION, except that in determining how to report crimes committed in a multiple-offense situation an institution must use the UCR Reporting Handbook. 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Crime Definitions from the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Handbook

Arson

Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Criminal Homicide-Manslaughter by Negligence

The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Criminal Homicide-Murder and Non-negligent Manslaughter

The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Robbery

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

Aggravated Assault

An unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe or aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm. (It is not necessary that injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used which could and probably would result in serious personal injury if the crime were successfully completed.)

Burglary

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Motor Vehicle Theft

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned including joyriding.)



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Weapon Law Violations

The violation of laws or ordinances dealing with weapon offenses, regulatory in nature, such as: manufacture, sale, or possession of deadly weapons; carrying deadly weapons, concealed or openly; furnishing deadly weapons to minors; aliens possessing deadly weapons; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.

Drug Abuse Violations

Violations of State and local laws relating to the unlawful possession, sale, use, growing, manufacturing, and making of narcotic drugs. The relevant substances include: opium or cocaine and their derivatives (morphine, heroin, codeine); marijuana; synthetic narcotics (Demerol, methadone); and dangerous non-narcotic drugs (barbiturates, Benzedrine).

Liquor Law Violations

The violation of laws or ordinances prohibiting: the manufacture, sale, transporting, furnishing, possessing of intoxicating liquor; maintaining unlawful drinking places; bootlegging; operating a still; furnishing liquor to a minor or intemperate person; using a vehicle for illegal transportation of liquor; drinking on a train or public conveyance; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned. (Drunkenness and driving under the influence are not included in this definition.)

Sexual Assault Information

The University of Wisconsin-Superior offers educational programs that promote the awareness of sexual assault, acquaintance sexual assault, sexual harassment, and sexual exploitation. All new students attend an educational session during the new student orientations program that explores these issues. Educational programs are offered in the halls and also throughout the campus. The Center Against Sexual or Domestic Abuse (CASDA) is located in Hawkes Hall and counselors are available at all times. All students, faculty and staff receive written information about sexual assault and harassment that includes the legal definitions of these terms, national, state and campus statistics on sexual assault, a description of victim's rights, a listing of services available to victims and information on protective behaviors to prevent sexual assault and sexual harassment.

Legal Definitions and Penalties

The following information prepared by UW System Legal Counsel provides a summary of offenses and corresponding penalties.



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Sexual Assault -- Section 940.225 of the Wisconsin Statutes creates four degrees of sexual assault. The degrees are based upon the amount of force used by the assailant and the harm done to the victim. First, Second and third degree sexual assault are felonies; fourth degree assault is a misdemeanor.

First degree sexual assault includes:

- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact without consent which causes pregnancy or inflicts great bodily harm.
- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact without consent accomplished by using or threatening to use a dangerous weapon, or
- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact without consent while aided by one or more persons by use of threat or violence.
- * A person can be imprisoned not more than forty years for committing first degree sexual assault.

Second degree sexual assault includes:

- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact without consent which causes pregnancy or inflicts great bodily harm.
- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact without consent which causes injury, including illness, disease, or impairment of sexual or reproductive organ or mental anguish requiring psychiatric care, or
- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact with a person known by the perpetrator to be unconscious or mentally ill or mentally deficient.
- * Sexual intercourse or sexual contact aided or abetted by another without the victim's consent.
- * A person can be imprisoned not more than twenty years and/or fined not more than \$10,000 for committing second degree sexual assault.

Third degree sexual assault is having sexual intercourse with a person without that person's consent. The penalty for third degree sexual assault is imprisonment for not more than five years and/or a fine of not more than \$10,000.

Fourth degree sexual assault is having sexual contact with a person without that person's consent. The penalty for fourth-degree sexual assault is imprisonment for not more than nine months in the county jail and/or a fine of not more than \$10,000.

Sex Offenses Definitions

From the National Incident-Based Reporting System Edition of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.



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Sex Offenses - Forcible

Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent.

A. ***Forcible Rape***- The carnal knowledge of a person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity (or because of his/her youth).

B. ***Forcible Sodomy***- Oral or anal sexual intercourse with another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

C. ***Sexual Assault With An Object***- The use of an object or instrument to unlawfully penetrate, however slightly, the genital or anal opening of the body of another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity.

D. ***Forcible Fondling***- The touching of the private body parts of another person for the purpose of sexual gratification, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or, not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent because of his/her youth or because of his/her temporary or permanent mental incapacity.

Sex Offenses - Non-forcible

Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse.

A. ***Incest***- Non-forcible sexual intercourse between persons who are related to each other within the degrees wherein marriage is prohibited by law.

B. ***Statutory Rape***- Non-forcible sexual intercourse with a person who is under the statutory age of consent.

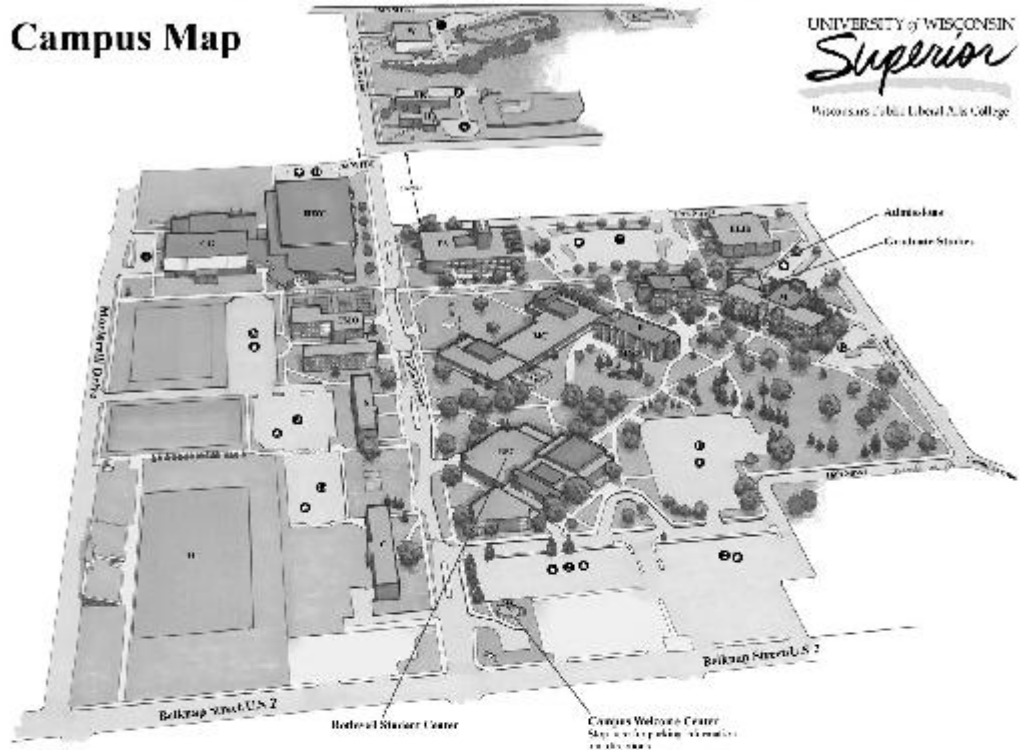

In complying with the statistical reporting requirements under paragraphs (c)(1) and (3) of this section, an institution may provide a map to current and prospective students and employees that depicts its campus, non-campus buildings or property, and public property areas if the map accurately depicts its campus, non-campus buildings or property, and public property areas.

(9) Statistics from police agencies. In complying with the statistical reporting requirements under paragraphs (c)(1) through (4) of this section, an institution must make a reasonable, good faith effort to obtain the required statistics and may rely on the



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information supplied by a local or State police agency. If the institution makes such a reasonable, good faith effort, it is not responsible for the failure of the local or State police agency to supply the required statistics.

Access to Campus Facilities Sec. 668.46(b)(3)

A statement of current policies concerning security of and access to campus facilities, including campus residences, and security considerations used in the maintenance of campus facilities.



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During times the university is normally in operation (this excludes most holidays), building and facilities are generally accessible to members of the campus community, guests and visitors during normal business hours, Monday through Friday, and for limited designated hours on weekends. The exterior doors to student residence halls are normally locked between the hours of 10:00 p.m. – 6:00 a.m. Access is available to students only by use of a key. Males visiting females in Crownhart Hall must have an escort after 10:00 p.m. Most exterior doors of student residence facilities are equipped with electronic alarms that signal whenever the doors are opened during the regular lockup periods. The exterior doors to most campus buildings are unlocked during business hours and locked during all non-business hours. Individuals wishing to gain access to campus buildings after hours must obtain prior authorization from a department head and gain access through the Campus Safety Office.

Maintenance and Security of Campus Facilities Sec. 668.46(b)(3)

A statement of current policies concerning security of and access to campus facilities, including campus residences, and security considerations used in the maintenance of campus facilities.

The university maintains a strong commitment to campus safety and security. Exterior lighting is an important part of this commitment. Parking lots, pedestrian walkways and building exteriors and entrances are well lighted. Patrol officers conduct surveys of exterior lighting on campus daily, and reports of any concerns are documented and acted upon by the Facilities Management Department. The Director of Campus Safety conducts a comprehensive survey of all exterior lighting and environmental conditions each year. Members of the campus community are encouraged to report any exterior lighting deficiencies or environmental safety concerns to the Campus Safety Office by calling 394-8114.

Campus Safety officers routinely check all exterior doors and their locking mechanisms to ensure they function properly. Campus Safety officers secure exterior doors each evening. Any malfunction of doors or security hardware operation is reported on a daily basis. Officers make note of the condition of the grounds surrounding the university campus to ensure bushes, shrubbery and trees are properly trimmed. Campus Safety officers on both foot and vehicle patrol, monitor all parking lots and other public areas of the campus.

Law Enforcement Authority and Inter-Agency Relations Sec. 668.46(b)(4)

A statement of current policies concerning campus law enforcement that--

- (i) Addresses the enforcement authority of security personnel, including their relationship with State and local police agencies and whether those security personnel have the authority to arrest individuals;
- (ii) Encourages accurate and prompt reporting of all crimes to the campus police and the appropriate police agencies; and
- (iii) Describes procedures, if any, that encourage pastoral counselors and professional counselors, if and when they deem it appropriate, to inform the persons they are counseling of any procedures to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics.



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Campus Safety officers of the University of Wisconsin-Superior are not certified peace officers and do not have criminal arrest authority. The Director of Campus Safety or the Superior Police Department provide this service. The UW- Superior Campus Safety Office maintains a close working relationship with local law enforcement agencies, other higher education police and security departments, state and federal enforcement agencies and all appropriate elements of the criminal justice system. Regular informal and formal meetings are held and crime related reports and statistics are routinely exchanged.

Campus Recording Sec. 668.46(b)(5)

A description of the type and frequency of programs designed to inform students and employees about campus security procedures and practices and to encourage students and employees to be responsible for their own security and the security of others.

Efforts are made to advise members of the campus community on a timely basis about campus crime or crime related problems. These efforts include the following:

1. Annual Report. A comprehensive annual report of crime related information is compiled, published and distributed to all students and staff. This report is available to any interested party and will be issued upon request.
2. Crime Alert. When special circumstances warrant it, printed Crime Alerts can be prepared and posted or distributed, either selectively or throughout the campus, notifying employees and students of important crime related information.
3. Student Newspaper. The student newspaper, The Promethean, publishes a summary of all criminal incidents that have been reported to the Campus Safety Office.
4. Crime Log. The Campus Safety Office keeps a crime log listing all crimes reported to the Campus Safety Office. This log is available for public inspection during regular business hours.

Security Awareness and Crime Prevention Programs Sec. 668.46(b)(6)

A description of programs designed to inform students and employees about the prevention of crimes.

It is the philosophy at UW-Superior to fight crime proactively by preventing the opportunity for crime to be committed. The university crime prevention programs are based upon the dual concept of eliminating or minimizing criminal opportunities whenever possible, and encouraging students and employees to be responsible for their own and others security.

The following is a list of crime prevention programs:



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* Campus Reward System - A program aimed at reducing crime on campus by enlisting the involvement of members of the community. People who witness criminal activity can phone or e-mail Campus Safety at (715) 394-8114 or (715) 394- 8247. E-mail may be sent to mwallin@uwsuper.edu. Or you may use our on-line reporting form for crime information reporting. This information may lead to the witness receiving a monetary reward.

* Campus Safety website – The Campus Safety Office has its own website that is updated daily. This site hosts daily safety tips, up-to-date information on crime prevention and securing property. Safety concerns are posted on this site daily along with criminal alerts. <http://www.uwsuper.edu/safety>.

* The Campus Safety Office sponsors an annual Campus Safety Walk; all students, faculty and staff are encouraged to participate in the walk.

Sec. 668.46(b)(7)

A statement of policy concerning the monitoring and recording through local police agencies of criminal activity in which students engaged at off-campus locations of student organizations officially recognized by the institution, including student organizations with off-campus housing facilities.

** The University of Wisconsin-Superior has no recognized off-campus student organizations or off-campus housing facilities.

UW-Superior Standards of Conduct and University Sanctions Concerning Illicit Drugs and Alcohol Sec. 668.46(b)(8)

A statement of policy regarding the possession, use, and sale of alcoholic beverages and enforcement of State underage drinking laws.

Sec. 668.46(b)(9)

A statement of policy regarding the possession, use, and sale of illegal drugs and enforcement of Federal and State drug laws.

The University of Wisconsin System and University of Wisconsin-Superior prohibit the unlawful possession, use, distribution, manufacture, or dispensing of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on University property or as part of University activities. The use or possession of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on University premises, except in faculty and staff housing and as expressly permitted by the chief



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administrative officer or under institutional regulations, in accordance with s. UWS 18.06(13)(a), Wis. Adm. Code. Without exception, alcohol consumption is governed by Wisconsin statutory age restrictions under UWS 18.06 (13)(b), Wis. Adm. Code. The unlawful use, possession, distribution, manufacture or dispensing of illicit drugs ("controlled substances" as defined in ch. 161, Wis. Stats.) is prohibited in accordance with s. UWS 18.10, Wis. Adm., Code.

Violation of these provisions by a student may lead to the imposition of a disciplinary sanction, up to and including suspension or expulsion, under s. UWS 17.04(g) or (h), Wis. Adm. Code. University employees are also subject to disciplinary sanctions for violations of these provisions occurring on university property or the worksite or during work time, up to and including termination from employment.

Any student who engages in an activity, on campus or at an event sponsored by a center or institution or by the system, that constitutes a violation of ch. 161 is subject to non-academic misconduct disciplinary sanctions, as provided by the board by rule. In determining the appropriate sanction, the board or its designee shall consider those penalties, including suspension and expulsion, that will contribute most effectively to maintain a system environment that is free from controlled substances, as defined in s. 161.01(4).

Disciplinary sanctions are initiated and imposed in accordance with applicable procedural requirements and work rules, as set forth in Wisconsin statutes, administrative rules, faculty and academic staff policies, and collective bargaining agreements. Referral for prosecution, under criminal law is also possible. Further, violations of ss. UWS 18.06(13) and 18.10, Wis. Adm. Code may result in additional penalties as allowed under ch. UWS 18, Wis. Adm. Code. Employees who are convicted of any criminal drug statute violation occurring in the workplace must notify their dean, director or department chair within 5 days of the conviction if the employees are employed by the University at the time of the conviction.

Sec. 668.46(b)(10)

A description of any drug or alcohol-abuse education programs, as required under section 120(a) through (d) of the HEA. For the purpose of meeting this requirement, an institution may cross-reference the materials the institution uses to comply with section 120(a) through (d) of the HEA.

SEC. 120. ø20 U.S.C. 1011i; DRUG AND ALCOHOL ABUSE PREVENTION.

(a) RESTRICTION ON ELIGIBILITY.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no institution of higher education shall be eligible to receive funds or any other form of financial assistance under any Federal program, including participation in any federally funded or guaranteed student loan program, unless the institution certifies to the Secretary that the institution has adopted and has implemented a program to prevent the



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use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol by students and employees that, at a minimum, includes—

(1) the annual distribution to each student and employee of:

(A) standards of conduct that clearly prohibit, at a minimum, the unlawful possession, use, or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol by students and employees on the institution's property or as part of any of the institution's activities;

(B) a description of the applicable legal sanctions under local, State, or Federal law for the unlawful possession or distribution of illicit drugs and alcohol;

(C) a description of the health-risks associated with the use of illicit drugs and the abuse of alcohol;

(D) a description of any drug or alcohol counseling, treatment, or rehabilitation or re-entry programs that are available to employees or students; and October 23, 2002 Sec. 120 HIGHER EDUCATION ACT OF 1965 14

(E) a clear statement that the institution will impose sanctions on students and employees (consistent with local, State, and Federal law), and a description of those sanctions, up to and including expulsion or termination of employment and referral for prosecution, for violations of the standards of conduct required by subparagraph (A); and

(2) a biennial review by the institution of the institution's program to—

(A) determine the program's effectiveness and implement changes to the program if the changes are needed; and

(B) ensure that the sanctions required by paragraph (1)(E) are consistently enforced.

(b) INFORMATION AVAILABILITY. Each institution of higher education that provides the certification required by subsection (a) shall, upon request, make available to the Secretary and to the public a copy of each item required by subsection (a)(1) as well as the results of the biennial review required by subsection (a)(2).

(c) REGULATIONS.

(1) IN GENERAL. The Secretary shall publish regulations to implement and enforce the provisions of this section, including regulations that provide for:

(A) the periodic review of a representative sample of programs required by subsection (a); and

(B) a range of responses and sanctions for institutions of higher education that fail to implement their programs or to consistently enforce their sanctions, including information and technical assistance, the development of a compliance agreement, and the termination of any form of Federal financial assistance.

(2) REHABILITATION PROGRAM. The sanctions required by subsection (a)(1)(E) may include the completion of an appropriate rehabilitation program.

(d) APPEALS.—Upon determination by the Secretary to terminate financial assistance to any institution of higher education under this section, the institution may file an appeal with an administrative law judge before the expiration of the 30-day period beginning on the date such institution is notified of the decision to terminate financial assistance under this section. Such judge shall hold a hearing with respect to such termination of assistance before the expiration of the 45-day period beginning on the date that such appeal is filed. Such judge may extend such 45-day period upon a motion by the



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institution concerned. The decision of the judge with respect to such termination shall be considered to be a final agency action.

Sec. 668.46(b)(11)

A statement of policy regarding the institution's campus sexual assault programs to prevent sex offenses, and procedures to follow when a sex offense occurs. The statement must include:

- (i) A description of educational programs to promote the awareness of rape, acquaintance rape, and other forcible and nonforcible sex offenses;
- (ii) Procedures students should follow if a sex offense occurs, including procedures concerning who should be contacted, the importance of preserving evidence for the proof of a criminal offense, and to whom the alleged offense should be reported;
- (iii) Information on a student's option to notify appropriate law enforcement authorities, including on-campus and local police, and a statement that institutional personnel will assist the student in notifying these authorities, if the student requests the assistance of these personnel;
- (iv) Notification to students of existing on- and off-campus counseling, mental health, or other student services for victims of sex offenses;
- (v) Notification to students that the institution will change a victim's academic and living situations after an alleged sex offense and of the options for those changes, if those changes are requested by the victim and are reasonably available;
- (vi) Procedures for campus disciplinary action in cases of an alleged sex offense, including a clear statement that--
 - (A) The accuser and the accused are entitled to the same opportunities to have others present during a disciplinary proceeding; and
 - (B) Both the accuser and the accused must be informed of the outcome of any institutional disciplinary proceeding brought alleging a sex offense. Compliance with this paragraph does not constitute a violation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (20 U.S.C. 1232g). For the purpose of this paragraph, the outcome of a disciplinary proceeding means only the institution's final determination with respect to the alleged sex offense and any sanction that is imposed against the accused; and
- (vii) Sanctions the institution may impose following a final determination of an institutional disciplinary proceeding regarding rape, acquaintance rape, or other forcible or non forcible sex offenses.

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Sec. 668.46(b)(12)

Beginning with the annual security report distributed by October 1, 2004, a statement advising the campus community where law enforcement agency information provided by a State under section 170101(j) of the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994 (42 U.S.C. 14071(j)), concerning registered sex offenders may be obtained, such as the law enforcement office of the institution, a local law enforcement agency with jurisdiction for the campus, or a computer network address.

Sec. 668.46(d) Separate campus.

An institution must produce a separate annual report for each separate campus.

The University of Wisconsin-Superior has only one campus.

Sec. 668.46(e) Timely warning.

- (1) An institution must, in a manner that is timely and will aid in the prevention of similar crimes, report to the campus community on crimes that are--
 - (i) Described in paragraph (c)(1) and (3) of this section;
 - (ii) Reported to campus security authorities as identified under the institution's statement of current campus policies pursuant to paragraph (b)(2) of this section or local police agencies; and
 - (iii) Considered by the institution to represent a threat to students and employees.
- (2) An institution is not required to provide a timely warning with respect to crimes reported to a pastoral or professional counselor.

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Sec. 668.46(f) Crime log.

(1) An institution that maintains a campus police or a campus security department must maintain a written, easily understood daily crime log that records, by the date the crime was reported, any crime that occurred on campus, on a noncampus building or property, on public property, or within the patrol jurisdiction of the campus police or the campus security department and is reported to the campus police or the campus security department. This log must include--

- (i) The nature, date, time, and general location of each crime; and
- (ii) The disposition of the complaint, if known.

(2) The institution must make an entry or an addition to an entry to the log within two business days, as defined under paragraph (a) of this section, of the report of the information to the campus police or the campus security department, unless that disclosure is prohibited by law or would jeopardize the confidentiality of the victim.

(3)(i) An institution may withhold information required under paragraphs (f)(1) and (2) of this section if there is clear and convincing evidence that the release of the information would--

- (A) Jeopardize an ongoing criminal investigation or the safety of an individual;
- (B) Cause a suspect to flee or evade detection; or
- (C) Result in the destruction of evidence.

(ii) The institution must disclose any information withheld under paragraph (f)(3)(i) of this section once the adverse effect described in that paragraph is no longer likely to occur.

(4) An institution may withhold under paragraphs (f)(2) and (3) of this section only that information that would cause the adverse effects described in those paragraphs.

(5) The institution must make the crime log for the most recent 60-day period open to public inspection during normal business hours. The institution must make any portion of the log older than 60 days available within two business days of a request for public inspection.

If you request that we mail copies of records to you, mailing, processing and copying charges will be made. Should the total charge exceed \$5.00; a prepayment is to be made by you.

Public Access to Department Records

Purpose: The Purpose of this policy is to establish departmental guidelines governing when the public may receive information, access records, request records or obtain copies of records as set forth in Wisconsin State Statutes (Chapter 19, Subchapter II).

General Statement: The policy of the State of Wisconsin is that the public is entitled to receive virtually all information regarding the affairs of government and the official acts of its officers or employees who represent the public.

Procedure: All requests for department records shall be referred to the Director of Campus Safety. The Director of Campus Safety will review all requests for records and will authorize release of the records. No records will be released without the approval of the Director of Campus Safety.

Daily activity records are on file in the Campus Safety Office, Rothwell Student Center Room Number 53. Normal open business hours are Monday - Friday 8:00am - 4:00pm.

Dean of Students Office

Options through the Dean of Students Office may include disciplinary action if the offender is a student and a university policy has been violated. The Dean of Students Office will also discuss with you reporting to the Campus Safety Office or Superior Police Department. In addition, campus and community resources will be discussed and made available to you.

The student disciplinary procedures outlined in UWS 17, Student Disciplinary Procedures, are used to adjudicate campus disciplinary action for sexual assault. The opportunities for students to have the person(s) of their choice present during disciplinary hearings are outlined in UWS 17. The results of disciplinary hearings are communicated to the victim. Possible campus sanctions include probation, resignation or leave for



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misconduct, suspension or expulsion, written reprimand, and denial of particular university privileges.

The university will change a victim's academic and living situations after the alleged sex offense if those changes are requested by the victim and are reasonably available.

State of Wisconsin and Federal Legal Sanctions

Wisconsin

The Uniform Controlled Substances Act, Chapter 961 of the Wisconsin Statutes, regulates controlled substances and outlines specific penalties for the violation of regulations. A first-time conviction for the possession of a controlled substance can result in a sentence of up to one year in prison and a fine of up to \$5,000. (Sec. 961.41, Stats.) A person convicted of manufacturing a controlled substance, delivering a controlled substance, or possessing a controlled substance with the intent to manufacture or deliver, can be imprisoned for up to 30 years and fined up to \$1,000,000. (Sec. 961.41, Stats.)

Penalties vary according to the type of drug involved, the amount of drug confiscated the number of previous convictions, and the presence of any aggravating factors. The distribution of a controlled substance to a minor can lead to the doubling of an authorized sentence term. (Section 961.46(1), Stats.)

Wisconsin has formidable legal sanctions that restrict the use of alcohol in various situations. It is illegal to procure sell dispense or give away alcohol to anyone who has not reached the legal drinking age of 21 years. (Sec. 125.07(1)(a)(1), Stats.) Every adult has a legal obligation to prevent the illegal consumption of alcohol on premises owned by the adult or under the adult's control. (Section 125.07(1)(a)(3), Stats.) A first-time violator of either of the above subsections can be fined up to \$500.

It is against, the law for an underage person to procure or attempt to procure alcoholic beverage, to falsely represent, his or her age for the purpose of obtaining alcohol, to enter premises licensed to sell alcohol, or to consume or possess alcohol on licensed premises. (Sec. 125.07(4),Stats.) A first-time underage violator of section 125.07(4) can be fined up to \$500, ordered to participate in a supervised work program, and have their driver's licensed suspended.

Federal

The federal government has recently revised the penalties against drug possession and trafficking through its Federal Sentencing Guidelines that reduce the discretion that federal judges may use in sentencing offenders of federal drug statutes. Within these guidelines, courts can sentence a person for up to 6 years for unlawful possessions of a controlled substance, including the distribution of a small amount (less than 250 grams)



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of marijuana. A sentence of life imprisonment can result from a conviction of possession of a controlled substance that results in death or bodily injury. Possession of more than 5 grams of cocaine can trigger intent to distribute penalty of 10-16 years in prison. (U.S.S.G. s.2D2 (b)(1).)
