

Important Immigration Information for Canadian Students

The immigration-related information below is intended for Canadian citizens who will be enrolling at the University of Wisconsin-Superior.

As a Canadian citizen, you are not required to obtain a U.S. visa to enter the United States. However, when you enter the U.S., a U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) officer will inspect your papers, either at a pre-inspection site in Canada or upon entry to the United States. You must have with you:

- Proof of Canadian citizenship
- Your admission letter to UW-Superior
- Your UW-Superior Certificate of Eligibility (Form I-20)
- Proof of Federal SEVIS Fee Payment (See enclosed form, I-901 SEVIS Fee Remittance. Note that the fee can be paid on-line at www.fmjfee.com. Be sure to print and bring the receipt.)
- Proof of financial support that corresponds to the information on your I-20*

It is essential that you enter the United States in the appropriate status, so be sure to have complete documentation with you.

Also note that you should check your Form I-20 for the following:

- Is your **name** spelled correctly and in the same form as it appears in your passport or birth certificate, if you do not carry a passport?
- Is the **other information** correct—date and country of birth, degree program, program start date, financial information?
- Is it **signed** by a college official **using blue ink**?
- Has the **program start date** passed? (Students should not try to enter the US after the program start date indicated on the I-20.)

IMPORTANT: be sure to print your name and date and sign your name in blue ink in the appropriate space at the bottom of the first page of your I-20.
