Getting Started

UW-Superior strives to make your transition from veteran/military service to student as easy as possible so you can focus on your education. Our faculty and staff understand this can be a difficult process, so we try to accommodate each student on an individual basis. We offer opportunities both on-campus and online. Priority class registration is given to all veterans and active service members each semester to ensure you get into the classes you need. While it is ultimately the responsibility of the student-veteran, spouse or dependent to know what they need to do, UW-Superior has a veteran's benefit specialist to ensure a seamless transition to the university.

Here are the steps you need to take for success. Each of these steps will be expanded upon throughout this handbook.

- Applying for admissions •
- Request and gather all transcripts, military and educational
- Get an academic advisor
- Apply for veteran/military benefits and financial aid •
- Orientation/Welcome to UW-Superior

Enrollment at UW-Superior

Step One

Apply for admissions at UW-Superior at apply.wisconsin.edu. Fees and deposits may apply.

Step Two

Request ALL previous university/college/community college and technical school transcripts (high school transcript not required if associate degree obtained) as well as military transcripts.

Military Transfer Credit:

Persons who have been granted honorable or general discharge from military service of the United States and who would like a review of service records for potential college credit must request the appropriate documentation. Depending on the type of military service, you should request one of the following military transcripts:

Academic Advisors:

Once you are admitted to UW-Superior, our dedicated advisors will help you plan your degree and get you started on your educational journey. Our advisors begin working with students from the moment they are admitted, helping to guide them down their education path. They will help you choose a major, register for classes or just help point you in the right direction. Please contact them at advise@uwsuper.edu or uwsuper.edu/advise. Once you're ready, go to your UW-Superior E-Hive to register for classes under the direction of your advisor. One of the many advantages afforded veterans is priority registration for classes; please ask about this resource from either your advisor or the VNSC.

Student Advisement Responsibilities include:

- 1. Read the undergraduate catalog and refer to it frequently. You are expected to know your university studies (general education), major and minor requirements, and academic policies and procedures. If you need further clarification regarding requirements or procedures, ask your advisor.
- 2. Refer to the academic calendar at uwsuper.edu/calendar so you are aware of important academic dates, such as the last day to drop and add courses and early advisement and registration dates.
- 3. Learn to read your degree progress report. This advisement tool tells you what requirements you have fulfilled for general education, major, and minor requirements and which requirements you still need to fulfill. It also lists your cumulative and major and minor GPA. You can find your advisement report in your ehive-student center.
- 4. Use your UW-Superior email account weekly, if not daily. This is how your instructors, your advisor, and the university will contact you regarding important information.
- 5. Make sure you know your advisor. If you don't know who your advisor is, check your E-Hive account and click on "advisor" or visit the Center for Academic Advising and Career Services.
- 6. Get acquainted with your advisor early so you can become comfortable with each other and you can ask questions and get the answers you need before you find yourself with a problem.
- 7. Prepare for your advisement appointment.
 - Review your degree progress report and the class schedule so you know what courses you need and what courses are being offered for the next semester. Remember to check for courses that need instructor consent, so you'll know if you need to ask for a permission number or an override to allow for enrollment.
 - Review course descriptions in your catalog for the courses you want to take to ensure you have met any prerequisites required for enrollment. This is of paticular importance to education and business majors. Make sure you clarify with your advisor all program requirements.
 - Build two or three schedule options and bring these along with your degree progress report to your • advisement appointment.
 - Check your enrollment appointment time in your E-Hive account so you can schedule your advisement • appointment close to the first time you can register.

Credit for Prior Learning:

Credit for prior learning offers students with significant academic, life and work experience the chance to earn college credit by demonstrating what they have learned. Credit for prior learning can include credit transferred from other institutions of higher education and the military, credit by examination, prior learning demonstrated by portfolio, and some other non-collegiate experiences. Orientation/Welcome to Superior

As a veteran student you only need to attend/participate in ONE of the three orientation options:

Nontraditional Student Orientation Night: This two-hour orientation will cover Title IV information, all technology information you need to access, and highlight nontraditional student resources. During this orientation, you have time to ask questions to other students and gauge how their transition was into their academic career. This orientation is to make the transition into your time at UW-Superior easier and we have found in past years this orientation is well received and beneficial to those who have attended. You have the option to attend Nontraditional Student Orientation Night through the video conferencing tool Zoom. You will be provided a Zoom link as the event approaches. You will need a quiet room and a computer to access Zoom.

Weekend of Welcome: Weekend of Welcome (WOW) is a two-day orientation option that must be done on the UW-Superior campus. More information can be found at uwsuper.edu/wow.

UWS Policy on Grades and Academic Probation:

- Students are placed on academic probation whenever a student's:
- 1. Cumulative grade point average drops below 2.0, or
- 2. Semester grade point average is less than 1.66, regardless of the cumulative grade point average.

Attending Class

Students are responsible for attending class and meet the university's attendance policy. Failure to attend school may result in the termination of your enrollment certification which may carry financial penalties. If there are any questions you can contact your academic advisor, your veteran's benefits specialist, or anyone at the VNSC.
